Description Built ca. 1924, George's Grist and Flour Mill is a three-story, rectangular, frame, gable-roofed building with a one-story shed room; it is sheathed in corrugated metal siding and covered by a metal roof. Windows, which are placed irregularly on each story, are six-over-six. The structure contains its original roller mill equipment that processed flour and other feed and food grains for three different degrees of refinement.

Significance George's Grist and Flour Mill is significant in Lexington County's industrial history. It is the last mill known to have intact internal workings and was the last operating flour mill (until 1946) in the county and the last mill of any kind on Twelve Mile Creek. The building is the second grist and flour mill on the site. A previous mill, the Laurel Falls Mills, was operated on the site by E.J. George from before 1906 until burned in 1918. The present mill building, which was constructed ca. 1924 and operated until 1946 by Dibble George, son of E.J. George, milled feed grain, grist, flour, and whole wheat. Milled grains were bagged in two-, five-, and ten-pound paper sacks tied by hand with white wrapping string. The sacks carried the trade name, "George's Flour\*


Other Information The building and adjacent mill pond were purchased in 1981 by the Town of Lexington for the pond's water supply as an auxillary reservoir to the town's water system east along the same stream, Twelve Mile Creek. It is currently vacant, awaiting studies by town officials for possible restoration or adaptive reuse of the building.

\* Mill, Lexington, S.C." with an imprinted sheaf of wheat emblem and were sold in retail grocery stores in the county. Farmers from Lexington and surrounding counties came to the mill to have their wheat ground into flour; or corn, oats, barley, rye came seed, peas, and soybeans ground into feed for livestock?<sup>2</sup>
